A hearty sandwich made with bread, wet-cured ham, linguiça, fresh sausage like chipolata, steak or roast meat, and covered with melted cheese and a hot thick tomato and beer sauce. Often considered a twist on the French croque-monsieur.

Spot to Try: Café Santiago – famous for serving

one of the best Francesinhas in Porto.

Alheira – Unique Portuguese Sausage

A smoked sausage traditionally made from meats other than pork, mixed with bread, olive oil, lard, garlic, and paprika. Slow-cooked to perfection, it offers a burst of local flavors.

Spot to Try: Taberna Santo António

a favorite for traditional dishes.

Tripas à Moda do Porto – Traditional Tripe Stew

A beloved Porto specialty, this stew combines tripe with white beans, sausage, carrots, and various spices, topped with bread crumbs and parsley.

Spot to Try: O Antunes – known for its authentic and delicious take on this classic dish.

Bolinhos de Bacalhau – Popular Portuguese Snack

These tasty cod fishcakes are a staple in Porto's snack scene, made from a mix of shredded codfish, potatoes, onions, and parsley, then deep-fried until golden.

Spot to Try: Bolinhos do Jorge – renowned for their crispy and flavorful bolinhos.

Broa de Avintes – Traditional Corn Bread

A dense and flavorful cornbread that accompanies many meals in Porto. It has a unique sweet and earthy taste, with a crusty exterior and a soft interior.

Spot to Try: Padaria Ribeiro – a bakery famous for its traditional Portuguese bread.

Bifana – Seasoned Pork Sandwich

Thin slices of pork marinated in a garlicky white wine and paprika sauce, served in a bread roll. Simple yet incredibly satisfying. Spot to Try: Conga – "Casa das Bifanas" offers some of the best bifanas in the city.

Port Wine – The Famous Fortified Wine

Internationally renowned, Port wine is a sweet, fortified wine, typically enjoyed as a dessert wine. It comes in several varieties including Ruby, Tawny, White, and Rosé.

Spot to Try: Visit any of the wine cellars along the Douro River, such as Taylor's or Graham's,

for tastings and tours.

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RIB – Beef & Wine Porto:

A haven for meat lovers, offering a range of prime cuts paired with exquisite wines.

Restaurante Terra Nova:

Specializes in seafood, providing dishes crafted from fresh, local ingredients.

Fish Fish:

A seafood restaurant that brings modern twists to traditional Portuguese seafood dishes. O Comercial (Palacio da Bolsa): Set in the historic stock exchange building, this restaurant offers a refined dining experience.
